Inside a Bereavement Walk

t is a crisp, fall day in Vancouver. The morning sun is effervescent, as it filters through curved branches and brightly-coloured leaves. The Bereavement Walking Group is gathered in a circle near Vanier Park. The volunteer facilitator goes over group guidelines, and offers a brief check-in to open the walk. Other trained volunteers stand by, ready to lend a kind presence and compassionate ear.

They walk in pairs, winding their way along the ocean's edge. The air is mingled with the scent of autumn and fresh sea. They nod their heads as they walk; listening, talking. Their feet crunch along the gravel path blanketed with leaves.

This is no ordinary talk they are engaged in. They are sharing stories of the profound path each has been navigating in their own way, through the wild and unpredictable waters of loss and grief. The wind is infused with the sound of murmuring voices, and the comforting cadence of ocean wave and shuffling feet.

The Bereavement Walking Group is a long-standing program of the Vancouver Hospice Society (VHS). Founded by VHS volunteers Sue Wong and Sharon Harowitz, the walks have been offered 3 times a year since they first began in 2005.

Participants say they are drawn to the walks for the casual atmosphere, companionship, connection to nature, shared experience, and the sense of safety and support. For those who choose not to participate in a more structured support group or one-to-one counselling, the walks can provide an essential means of connection during what can be an intensely challenging time.

"The volunteers who facilitate these groups are incredibly kind and compassionate individuals who understand the profound impact death can have on those left behind," says VHS Clinical Counsellor, Kayla Hochfelder. Apart from offering on-site counselling



sessions at the hospice, Kayla provides educational and emotional support to volunteers who are involved with the walking groups. She is also available as a resource for walkers who discover they may need additional counselling or support.

Bereavement Walking Groups are offered on Wednesday and Saturday mornings at Kits Point in Vancouver, and run for 8 weeks in the spring, fall, and winter. There is the option to gather for coffee following each walk. (Juliet's Café in Kitsilano kindly reserves space for these post-walk gatherings).

There is no charge to participate, and walkers may join at any time (attendance at all walks is not required).

Volunteers Bring Pampering to Palliative Patients

The Lipstick Project is a compassionate group of certified professionals who provide free spa services to patients and families at the hospice. Their hope is to create brief moments of respite for those who are going through an incredibly challenging time. Services are available every 2nd Monday in the comfort and privacy of patient rooms, and include gentle massage, haircuts, and nail care.

The Lipstick Project was established in 2012 by a group of young women who wanted to bring dignity and beauty to those who are nearing the end of life. In a 6-month period alone, these amazing volunteers provided 27 manicures, 8 pedicures, 27 massages, and 10 haircuts to our patients and families – at an estimated value of over \$3,000!

Bedside Singers Offer Circle of Support



We hear them first; the sound of their beautiful voices trailing through the hospice hallways, gently announcing their presence onsite.

For the past 4 years, the Compass Chorus has come to the hospice twice a month to sing at the bedside of those nearing the end of life. The group (consisting of 3 or 4 women at a time) sings simple and compassionate songs intended to bring a sense of comfort and ease in the midst of suffering. "Music and song can surpass word and thought," says Chorus member Corinne Thorsell. "This can open the space for connection, and for sharing this profound time in a calm and gentle way."

The singers were drawn together 4 years ago by a common interest in the potential of the power of song, and the role it can play in supporting those going through the dying process. They formed a group and decided to call themselves "Compass Chorus" to represent a circle of support.

Corinne says chorus members consider it a privilege to share this "most human and special time," which has allowed them to reflect upon their own lives, while learning to become more comfortable with the process of letting go.

"Each person is on their individual path," says Corinne.
"We hope that our presence and our songs can support others in finding their own true north."



Townhouse Development Campaign Continues

Since we first learned of a rezoning application to build a townhouse development directly next to our hospice almost a year ago, VHS staff, volunteers and supporters have all been working hard to convince City Hall to reject the proposal.

If built, the direct proximity of this development to the hospice (see image) will severely disrupt the peace, privacy, and access to services for more than 150 individuals and their families who come to our hospice each year for end-of-life and bereavement care.

The application to rezone the current single-family home at 4575 Granville St. was submitted under the Interim Rezoning Policy for Affordable Housing Choices. While we support the City's initiatives to increase affordable rental housing units in Vancouver, at approximately \$3800 for a 3-bedroom unit, this development is neither affordable to the average citizen, nor is this location functionally compatible with the essential elements required for operating a hospice.

The development will include 21 units; 63% of which will be 3 bedroom homes. The 32-spot underground parking will require shared laneway access, causing a dramatic increase in traffic in the narrow one-car lane. This will block the ONLY access for ambulances, hearses, service vehicles, and families coming to the hospice. This will cause an overall increase in neighbourhood traffic, and a marked reduction in available street parking.

The peaceful view for patients and families from the entire



north side of the hospice will be completely obstructed. As well, the anticipated 2-year construction phase will severely disrupt patients and families, and may lead to a complete closure of the hospice, forcing patients to rely on emergency services and acute care admissions at local hospitals.

The transport of bodies from the back lane - an intensely private and emotional experience for loved ones saying their final goodbyes - may be exposed to additional onlookers.

Since the October civic election, we have completed a comprehensive report outlining our objections to the proposed development. This report has recently been sent to the new Mayor and all Vancouver City Councillors (the majority of whom have either toured the hospice, or are personally aware of our situation). The report not

only outlines our key issues, but also emphasizes the strong and widespread community support we have received from hospice patients and bereaved family members, volunteers, neighbours, the Seniors' Advisory Committee, Vancouver Coastal Health, local media, and thousands of concerned citizens of Vancouver.

Should the application go to a Public Hearing in 2019, we will restrategize (which will likely include ramping up our PR campaign to increase public support).

As a result of positive media coverage, we have had hundreds of volunteers and neighbours attend public meetings and write letters to City Hall, and thousands of supporters sign our online petition. We remain hopeful for a successful outcome.

Our clinical team continues to provide excellent end-of-life and bereavement care at the hospice, and our expanding hospice volunteer team continues to offer compassionate support to patients and families both in the hospice and in the community. Volunteers who run the Hospice Opportunity Boutiques (HOB's) continue to deliver spectacular support to VHS. In 2019, we can also expect an all-new configuration of HOB Too and HOB Too Furniture. Stay tuned!

We are thankful for the year that has passed; and as we renew ourselves, we look forward to a positive and hopeful future.
